A new MDM service implies a new approach to Data Governance and Stewardship, of course, so that track would be my next target. I've done this before in a previous life - are there new things to be learned, or could I be giving the lecture? EIM remains a big part of my role (and a subject near and dear to my heart), so that would lead me to my second tutorial, Susan Earley and Ken King, "Data Strategy and Mapping", and maybe Peggy Bocks, "What is a Sustainable EIM Strategy?"

That would leave me 4 sessions for things that just peak my curiosity (unstructured data, engaging the business), and of course "the backup plan" - what is my second choice if I sit down in a session and discover it isn't what I expected? All that and a list of vendors I want to be sure to see and I'm ready to go!

The Future Generation of Data Management Professionals

Dr. Peter Aiken, president of DAMA International, pointed out that most college students in IT or business programs usually only take *one* required database course. That one course typically covers some introductory concepts of relational databases and an overview of SQL. Usually students create a small Access database to reinforce the concepts. This is barely enough to scratch the surface of data management!

There are few academic programs, especially at the undergraduate level, that focus on data management. I am happy to announce that the department of Computer and Information Technology at Indiana University-Purdue University of Indianapolis (IUPUI) now offers a data management track for undergraduate students. I am fortunate to be an active part of this curriculum. I am able to share some of my professional experiences through teaching courses in data warehousing, advanced database design, and database programming. It is exciting to exchange ideas with students who are either currently involved in data management roles or aspire to become data management professionals in their future careers.

It makes me stop to think about how most of us ended up in data management. I imagine that very few, if any, of us graduated from college with a degree focused in databases. If your story is anything like mine, I started out doing something completely different. I started out as a mainframe COBOL programmer, and somehow landed into Oracle and data warehousing. I am so glad that this happened, or I may still be writing COBOL programs today (no offense to COBOL programmers).

So what can we do to encourage our future generation of data management professionals?

Here are some thoughts:

- Support your local colleges and universities. Perhaps volunteer to give a guest lecture or presentation.
- If you know any college students (could be family, friends, or neighbors), encourage them that data management is a fascinating, growing profession and a great career opportunity.
- When you see students at any of our DAMA events, be sure to greet them and offer your guidance and support.
- Spread the word about our local DAMA chapter and the benefits of becoming a member.

Thank you for being part of our local data management community, and hats off to our future generation of data management professionals!

In addition, our own Christi Denney from Eli Lilly will be presenting on Master Data Management.

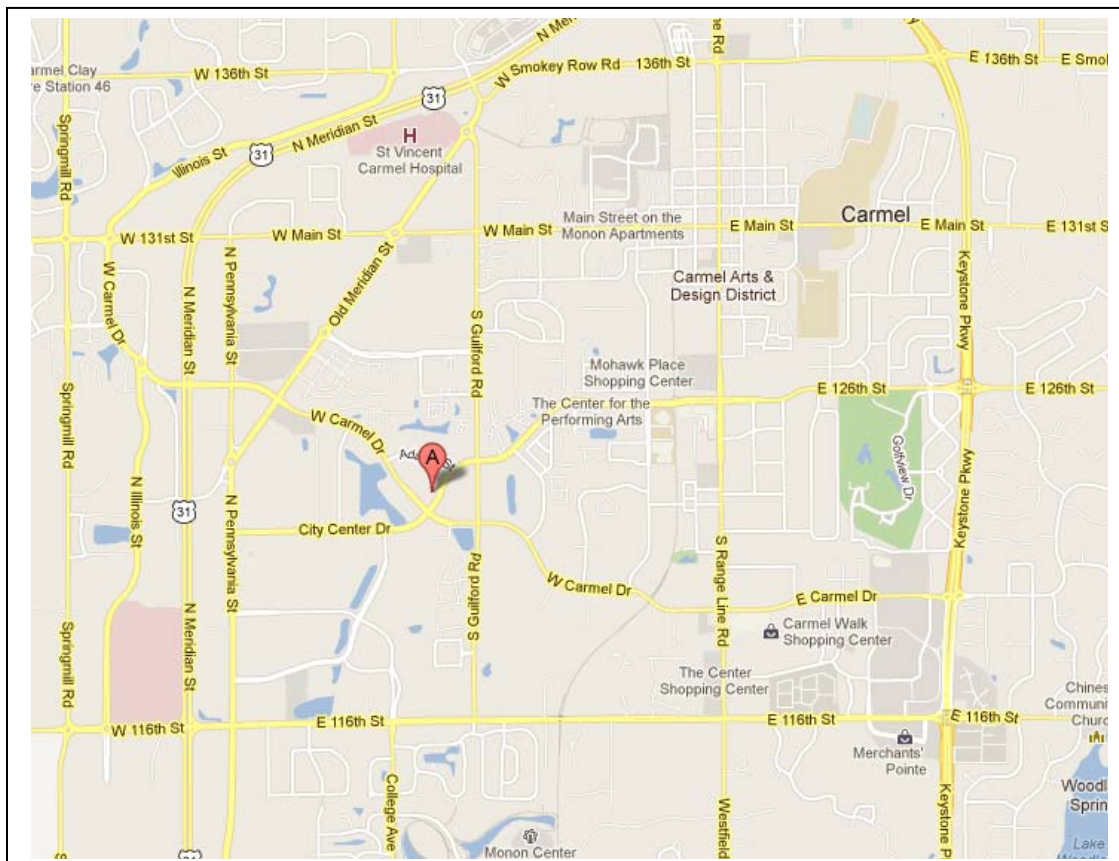
As always, this is also a great opportunity to network with other data management colleagues.
