Conference Connections

Earlier this year at the EDW conference, as I was gathering my things together after presenting my talk, a person came up to me and asked if I would present the same topic (Enterprise Data Sharing) at their conference later in the year. It turns out that person was Rossano Tavares, the president of DAMA Brazil, and the conference was DMC-LATAM 2015 to be held in São Paulo in August. This request caught me completely off guard for a few minutes, but as Rossano was describing the conference to me and stating that the conference would pick up the expenses, I came around to my senses and said "Sure, I'll do it!"

This was the first time that I would be traveling outside the U.S. (the previous trips to Canada really don't count) and I was pretty jazzed by the opportunity (although not so jazzed about all the vaccines I had to get before heading to Brazil). My wife, April, was to join me on the trip (her airline ticket was my only real expense I had to pay for) and as the date got closer, we were going back and forth between being nervous and excited.

We left Indy for São Paulo on the evening of Monday, August 10th, and arrived Tuesday morning after 15 hours of travel, 10.5 hours of that time spent in the air from Dallas to São Paulo. There was a driver waiting for us at the airport to take us to the conference hotel, the Hotel Braston, which was located in the central part of the city. The city itself is huge; São Paulo is the largest city in South America with a metro population of some 20 million residents. It is a modern city but definitely looked somewhat old and worn. Our accommodations at the hotel were, to quote April, "simple, but relaxed". People were very friendly and wherever we went we could find at least one person who spoke some degree of English (Portuguese is the primary language of Brazil). The food was great -- we did not ever have a bad meal -- and my favorite new drink became a soda called Guaraná Antarctica. Delicious!

Since the conference was not until Thursday and Friday, our host, Rossano, took us on a tour of the city. We visited a couple of museums and a cathedral, and had a refreshing lunch at a local city market. We saw lots of people moving busily to and fro wherever we went. The day was capped off with a nice dinner at a traditional "pizzeria paulistana."

Since I was not speaking until Friday morning, I could sit and thoroughly take in the discussions on Thursday. The conference attracted close to 150 attendees and all the sessions were held in a good-sized meeting room. Given that most of the presenters were speaking in Portuguese, I had to utilize the provided head phones to hear the English translation. The conference obtained two translators who sat in an enclosed room, more like a box, in the back of the room and they tag-teamed translations back and forth between English and Portuguese.

The sessions presented covered common data topics: Governance, quality, taxonomy, Big Data, security, legacy systems, and analytics. One session that I liked was on the topic of MDM and how most MDM projects end up not successful because they only achieve the "MD" part of MDM. The promises of management of "MD" are not realized. (Hmmm, this might explain why I tend to focus more on master data sharing than master data management...) The best session though, in my opinion, was presented by a business person, whose name was Dean, and who realized that he was a Data Steward.

Dean works for the largest oil company in Brazil (Petrobras) and talked about the data issues his area encountered and how he put together a mini-governance process to assure that certain data, critical to identifying possible drilling locations, were captured and entered correctly within their applications. He did a lot of this effort himself and, sadly, with minimal help from IT.

The takeaway for me (actually for all of us data geeks) is that we need to be on the lookout for folks like Dean within our organizations and try to provide them assistance whenever possible.

On Friday morning, I finally presented my session (ironically it was right after Dean's session and I made a joke about having a tough act to follow). The biggest concern I had was saying something in English that might not translate well into Portuguese (BTW - I know that at this moment any of you reading this who know me could understand my concern...;) The session appeared to go well, but it was a little weird not getting questions while I was speaking; however, folks made up for that after I finished as I had a number of great discussions with some of the attendees.

I must have done ok because, according to the survey results put together after the conference, I was rated the second highest speaker amongst the 17 total presenters (I was one of 4 speakers from the U.S. with the rest from South America). Another cool thing was that April was able to attend my session. It was the first time she has ever seen me speak at an event like this. In fact, I ended my presentation noting that point to the attendees and asked them to let April know if I did a good job. A number of them actually did go over to talk with April. Pretty cool!

We headed back to Indy the next evening and, after the long trip, successfully made it home Sunday afternoon. It was a great experience and I hope to get the opportunity to do it again next year. Rossano mentioned that he is looking to hold the conference in Rio next year or possibly in Buenos Aires in conjunction with the recently established DAMA Argentina chapter. Either place sounds good to me!
